Welcome/Approval of Minutes: Kevin welcomed all those in attendance.

*Mark May made a motion to approve the June 2010 minutes.
Brad Overmoe seconded the motion. The motion was
unanimously approved.*

PM10 Update and Discussion: Bryce Bird distributed air quality current standards. EPA addresses the standards every five (5) years to ensure protection of the public health environment. The table illustrates air quality standards and gives current ambient air standards. The last revision was done in June 2010.

CASAC provided an evaluation to air standards and reviews the current standards to ensure health standards protect the environment. This summer a draft revision and justification to that standard were presented. EPA will take about one year (April) and is looking at reviewing annual standards for PM 2.5 to change from 15 micrograms per cubic meter (ug/m³) to a range between 13-14 ug/m³ and a range of 50 to 85 ug/m³ for the 24 hour PM10 standard. Overviews of the primary standards were given. Discussion items included:

1. Primary standards for fine particles (PM2.5) - 13 to 11 µg/m³ annual and retain the 24 hour standard (35 ug/m³)
2. Primary standard for thoracic course particles - 85 ug/m³ down to about 65 ug/m³ in conjunction with a 98th percentile form
3. Secondary standards for PM related visibility impairment - PM2.5 light extinction, in the range of 191 to 64 /Mm
4. Secondary standards for non-visibility welfare effects - insufficient information to assess

It was recommended that EPA not retain PM10 standards. Transportation is also a big issue. PM related visibility impairment standards are related to area-wide emissions and values. Salt Lake is one of the urban areas in the evaluation. Although, it is only based on health effects, EPA will work with CASAC for the final recommendations.

It was commented there may not be any counties that will be in attainment. Almost any source which has any particulate emissions will be impacted. It was questioned why economics were never considered in the decision making. Concerns were expressed that there were flaws to the scientific data.

The State and locals will be making comments and recommendations, and then the State will prepare for public comment.

It was asked how non-attainment will affect future businesses coming into Salt Lake. The new regulations will have a significant impact on growth. Bryce commented that EPA is not in the business of looking for solutions. The emphasis has not been on the level of standards, but more on the implementation of standards. Bryce requested a copy of Paul's study

DEQ Business Assistance Webpage: Frances Bernards provided an overview of the revised Business Assistance Webpage. The Webpage has been streamlined to provide businesses with the tools required for environmental permitting, compliance issues, and environmental improvement. Businesses can access the new Webpage through the Business gateway on DEQ's main page or through BizHelp at www.deq.BizHelp.utah.gov.

The Webpage includes a Green Makes Business Sense site that features tools and resources to help businesses improve their overall environmental performance. Resources include Key Step Guides on recycling, sustainability programs, environmentally preferable purchasing, reusable shipping containers, and green teams. The site also includes industry specific resources and local case studies.

The Webpage includes detailed information on environmental permitting requirements with an emphasis on Pre-design meetings that introduce businesses to DEQ's permitting process. In addition, the website includes resources to help businesses comply with environmental regulations.

Board members were encouraged to review the new Business Assistance Webpage and provide feedback on whether any changes need to be made or resources should be added.

Paul was assigned to contact the Chamber of Commerce for posting links to the new Webpage. Marie commented on the navigation for each page, and Frances will follow-up.

Other Business: Paul reported that Board replacements have not been finalized. Apparently, the procedure is more complex to fill a vacancy. Applicants are now required to write the Governor, so we are waiting for the report on what needs to be done.
